Ecclesiastes 4:1-8 The Oppressed Have No Comforter – Vanity of Toil Folly In Toil Of The Lonely Without Heir

- ^{1.}Then I returned and considered all the oppression that is done under the sun: And look! The tears of the oppressed, But they have no comforter On the side of their oppressors *there is* power, But they have no comforter.
- ² Therefore I praised the dead who were already dead, More than the living who are still alive.
- ³ Yet, better than both *is he* who has never existed, Who has not seen the evil work that is done under the sun.
- ⁴ Again, I saw that for all toil and every skillful work a man is envied by his neighbor. This also *is* vanity and grasping for the wind.
- ⁵ The fool folds his hands And consumes his own flesh.
- ⁶ Better a handful with quietness Than both hands full, together with toil and grasping for the wind.
- ⁷ Then I returned, and I saw vanity under the sun:
- ⁸ There is one alone, without companion: He has neither son nor brother. Yet there is no end to all his labors, Nor is his eye satisfied with riches. But he never asks, "For whom do I toil and deprive myself of good?" This also is vanity and a grave misfortune.

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Facts Revealed:

- ❖ ·Then I returned and considered all the oppression that is done under the sun: And look! The tears of the oppressed, But they have no comforter — On the side of their oppressors there is power, But they have no comforter. [Ecclesiastes 4:1]
 - ♦ The oppressors have power, the oppressed have no comforter.
- ★ Therefore I praised the dead who were already dead, More than the living who are still alive.
 - Yet, better than both *is he* who has never existed, Who has not seen the evil work that is done under the sun. [Ecclesiastes 4:2-3]
 - ♦ The despair of the eye of flesh without knowledge of God.
 - ♦ Solomon as an old man in his fallen state saw only through the eye of flesh. [1 Kings 11:1-13]
 - ❖ From the perspective of the flesh, the dead are viewed as in an enviable situation not aware the evil around them.
 - ♦ Those who have never been even more enviable having never been exposed to oppression.

- Again, I saw that for all toil and every skillful work a man is envied by his neighbor. This also *is* vanity and grasping for the wind. [Ecclesiastes 4:4]
 - ♦ People tend to envy the worker who is gifted and talented.
 - ♦ Solomon saw that also as vanity and grasping for the wind.
- ★ The fool folds his hands And consumes his own flesh.
 Better a handful with quietness Than both hands full, together with toil and grasping for the wind. [Ecclesiastes 4:5-6]
 - ♦ The laziness of a fool is self destructive.
 - ♦ A handful of quietness is worth more than both hands grasping for the wind.
- ★ Then I returned, and I saw vanity under the sun:

There is one alone, without companion: He has neither son nor brother.

Yet there is no end to all his labors, Nor is his eye satisfied with riches.

But he never asks, "For whom do I toil and deprive myself of good?"

This also is vanity and a grave misfortune. [Ecclesiastes 4:7-8]

- ♦ The labor of one without companion, son or brother is never ended.
- ♦ He is not satisfied with riches not does he consider to whom he will leave his wealth.
- → Jesus spoke of a rich man ready to retire and called him a fool whose soul God required that very night, not rich toward God. [Luke 12:16-21]
- ♦ Solomon called it vanity, a grave misfortune.
